




2 Database





- 4 494,580 inseminations have been received so far in 2008, compared with 344,277 in 2007 for the same period.
- The work on reviewing the AI software for next season is continuing. We expect to have a session with each of the AI organisations using handhelds, beginning next week.
- 4 At this stage, over 50,000 suckler herds have had at least one calving in 2008. The number of calves with a meal feeding introduction has increased to 218,000, which is positive.
- Work on the Teagasc Discussion Group reports is continuing. A number of the reports have been completed, and the remainder will be completed over the next number of weeks.
- → Developments in relation to Gene Ireland payments are being completed and payments for inseminations and calvings in 2008 will be made next week.
- The revamp of the Milk Recording system is underway. A significant amount of 'back-end' work will need to be completed before we engage with the milk recording organisations in terms of how screens/functionality etc will need to be updated to take account of their needs.

3 Sheep

The project team, working mostly by email, have focused this week on finalising their report to the Interim Board. The report covers the four main issues addressed at last weeks workshop – identification, recording, genetic evaluation and breeding schemes. It will provide a clear direction for the Irish sheep industry and is focused on ensuring a profitable industry.

4 Genomics

The joint TEAGASC and ICBF research initiative to integrate genomic selection into Irish dairy cattle breeding continues to make good progress. There has been a good response to our request for herd owners to help us locate semen from bulls of interest. Next week we will be providing an update on progress to the Irish AI industry. We have also been involved in discussions with potential collaborators in other countries. These discussions are focused on ensuring Irish farmers benefit to the greatest extent possible from the accelerated rates of genetic gain and cost reductions possible through the effective use of genomic selection.

5 Herd Health Initiatives

A meeting was held on Wednesday this week involving ICBF, TEAGASC and UCD. The meeting focused on TEAGASC research plans for aspects of health in dairy and beef herds. It also considered the desire of dairy and beef herd owners to have access to herd health services which enable them to:

- ♣ identify the health status of animals they are considering for purchase,
- to demonstrate the health status of animals they are selling,
- ♣ to supply milk which meets the standards required by processors and
- ♣ to reduce production costs associated with poor animal health.

The implications of these discussions for ICBF will be reported at the next ICBF Board meeting.

6 Tully

We are pleased to announce that Stephen Conroy has been appointed as Tully Manager. Stephen is currently completing PhD studies at TEAGASC Grange. His work there involves: beef feeding, recording and management, ultrasonic scanning, linear scoring and carcass dissection. Stephen will attend the next meeting of the Tully Advisory Committee and will start work at Tully in mid November.

In the meantime, Niall Kilrane will continue as acting Tully Manager.

7 Genetic Evaluations

- The official proofs for dairy and beef have been updated on the website and the bull search at www.icbf.com. The remaining informational files will be placed on there in the coming days. The new proofs will be copied to the live database over the weekend.
- Ross Evans spoke at an informational meeting at Tullamore mart for Teagasc advisors as part of the Suckler Cow Welfare Scheme. Teagasc advisors will be repeating this to farmers at mart events across the country as part of the education aspect of the scheme.

8 G€N€ IR€LAND®

Dairy



- The proofs for the Spring 2005 test bulls are presented below. Next week we will do a comparison with ancestry information once the database has been fully updated. We plan to do another run in October which will add further production data and include linear score information. The results of this run will then be used for G€N€ IR€LAND® awards (top bulls) in early November.
- The extract was taken for the first round of payments for Spring 2008 recorded inseminations. We will be making payments on 29,134 inseminations (60% of straws dispatched). These will be made next week.
- Further to collecting Farmer Rating scores on 1st lactation animals from herds involved in this years linear scoring and targeted G€N€ IR€LAND® herds, there is now the facility for all herds signed up to ICBF to provide feedback on their animals via the ICBF website. This service can be located under the 'Record Events' section on the farmer homepage and is labeled 'Record Farmer Rating'. We encourage as many farmers as possible to provide ICBF with farmer rating scores. The objective is to use this information in

genetic evaluations and establish further links to profitability traits such as production, fertility and health, so the more data obtained the more reliable the evaluations.
