3. IGenoP

Next Thursday (14th October) we will be making a public presentation of the design of the IGenoP system for facilitating the sharing of genotypes worldwide. If you know of anybody who would be interested in participating please email me (bwickham@icbf.com).

The benefits expected to be delivered of IGenoP include:

- 1. **Larger training population** this is of benefit, regardless of the size of training population currently available for a country.
- 2. **Removal of selection bias** access to genotypes of all selection candidates enables the national evaluation system to eliminate the risk of genomic selection bias.


- 3. **More accurate genomic evaluations for imported animals** compared with GMACE or converted breeding values.
- 4. **More rapid delivery of genomic breeding value** for imported animals/semen due to having ready access to genotypes for selection candidates.
- 5. **Saving of costs** associated with researching, creating, building and maintaining a database of genotypes for genomic evaluations.
- 6. **Improved competitive position** of local breeding organisations.


4. ICAR 2012 (www.icar2012.ie)

This week the first meeting of the Irish Organising Committee for ICAR 2012 was held. John O'Sullivan is the Chairman of the Committee. The event is scheduled over five days from Monday 28th May to Friday 1st June 2012 in Cork and is expected to be attended by some 400 international delegates. ICAR is focused on animal performance recording and genetic evaluations. Key decisions taken at this first meeting of the organising committee included:


- A commitment to involving the dairy, beef and sheep breeding industries.
- To ensure we put together a program that is attractive to the largest possible international audience.
- To ensure recent developments in cattle and sheep breeding in Ireland are featured.
- To establish a theme which highlights the link between animal recording and the long term profitability of dairy, beef and sheep farming.

- ♣ The stats above are compiled with the assistance of DAFF AIM systems.
- ♣ In the Suckler scheme, the number of 2010 born calves with meal introduced is 356,610 with the number of animals weaned at 97,587.
- Work is nearing completion on the new catalogue service to herdbooks and breeders. The beef catalogue service will be launched this weekend.

- ♣ A development update to the Beef Slaughter report continued this week.
- The design of a new infrastructure to manage genotypes at ICBF is continuing.
