- 2. Dairy Breeding Conference Meeting

The key outcomes (a copy of the presentations can be found in the publications section of our website – www.icbf.com) of the Consultation meeting held on Wednesday this week included:

- The splitting of "beef" Sub Index into two parts giving a "maintenance" Sub Index and a "beef" Sub Index. This change separates the impact of liveweight on the cost of maintaining a dairy cow from its impact on the returns from sale of cull cows and surplus calves. At a future date it is expected that the "beef" Sub Index will be modified to incorporate evaluations based on Mart data for calf values and weights.
- ♣ Revision of the economic weights in the EBI as a result of lower long term milk price projections (from the current €0.30/litre to €0.27/litre) and higher costs for fertilizer and replacements.
- The impacts of these changes are summarized in the following table of "old" and the 2010 economic weights for traits included in each economic Sub Index.

- As a consequence of these changes the EBI will reduce on average by €7. Correlations between the new and old evaluations are very high and there will thus be little re-ranking of animals.
- ↓ ICBF is to proceed with the implementation of these changes for the January 2010 evaluations.
- Work on new fertility and calving evaluations is progressing with test runs to be reported to a further meeting of the Consultation Group in January.

3. Dairy Breeding Conference

On Thursday this week over 400 farmers attended a very successful ICBF dairy cattle breeding conference at Cork Mart Corrin facility near Fermoy. The morning session (copies of the presentations can be found in the







publications section of our website) which was sponsored by FBD Trust comprised five presentations covering developments in dairy genetic evaluations, HerdPlus and G€N€IR€LAND.

4. ACC Bank EBI Discussion Group Winners

- The €10,000 first prize in the EBI Discussion Group Competition was won jointly by the Damer Dairy Discussion based in the midlands and the Crookstown Dairy Discussion Group from Cork. The prize was presented to the winning groups in Fermoy, Co. Cork, on Thursday, 10 December. This is the first time there have been joint winners of the competition and reflects the higher performance being achieved by farmers. Both groups achieved 473 marks out of 500 in the competition. Over one thousand dairy farmers, members of seventy four dairy discussion groups from around the country participated in this hotly contested competition.
- 4 County Tipperary was the winning county, with the highest number of groups participating in the competition. A prize fund of €,000 will be shared by the eleven participating groups in county Tipperary. There were nine other category winners in the competition.
- ↓ The EBI competition promotes better breeding on dairy farms. Its €42,000 prize fund was sponsored by ACCBank and the competition is run in association with Teagasc, ICBF and the Farmers Journal. Speaking at the EBI awards Sean Farrell, National Agri Manager at ACCBank said "ACCBank is delighted to continue our sponsorship of the EBI Competition. The improvements in EBI being achieved in some herds throughout the country are an example to all milk producers of what can be achieved within local discussion groups."
- Commenting on the event, ICBF chief executive, Brian Wickham complimented the increases in quantity and quality of dairy replacements achieved by group members. "The fact that both the number of AI bred

females (up from 26 to 30 females per 100 cows) and average EBI of bulls used (up from \notin 131 to \notin 46) had increased significantly, is a confirmation that the objectives of the competition are being achieved. Well done to all participants".

Speaking on behalf of the judges in the competition, Teagasc Dairy Specialist, George Ramsbottom said: "There is a strong link between high EBI and profitability on farms. The improvements that have flowed from the higher rate of adoption of the participating groups of better genetics, identified through genomic selection, is one of the most pleasing aspects of this years competition. "

Judging in the competition took a new format this year. The groups underwent a three stage process;

Stage 1 - Business Financial Exercise based on a cash flow case study.

Stage 2 - Interview with three judges which focused on aspects of the groups breeding performance during the 2009 season.

Stage 3 – Debriefing session where the groups met Teagasc dairy specialists to identify the three or four key take home messages from the competition.

- Jack Kennedy, Dairy Editor of the Irish Farmers Journal congratulated all the winning groups and those that participated in the competition. He said; "It was a huge undertaking to meet with 74 groups and over 1,000 farmers. However, the effort was entirely justified, especially when you see at first hand the improvements in performance that groups are now achieving. Well done to all of the groups involved in this years competition and we look forward to meeting more groups through a larger and expanded competition next year".
- The Crookstown Group consists of 14 dairy farmers, is chaired by Liam Leahy and facilitated by Teagasc Adviser Seamus Lordan. Members have an average herd EBI for the group of €82. Milk sales for 2009 averaged 770 kilograms of milk solids per hectare at the end of September.
- In the Damer Group consists of 23 dairy farmers principally from counties Tipperary and Laois and is chaired by John Butler from Templemore and facilitated by Teagasc's Matt Ryan, Fintan Monahan and Michael Hogan. The average herd EBI for the group is €85. Milk sales for 2009 averaged 766 kilograms of milk solids per hectare at the end of September.





5. Database

- In the Suckler scheme, the number of 2009 born calves with meal introduced is 535,000, with the number of animals weaned at 376,000.
- The systems upgrade continued this week, with the testing and reporting environments upgraded. This week, we have been working tidying up any loose ends, and working with the various organisations to help smooth the transition.



- All four milk recording organisations are working well on the new Milk Recording system. We are continuing to update the software based on feedback from the organisations.
- There are a number of project currently being finalised. The AI Code application is now in test mode, and the final changes are being made to the Sheep application for Sheep Ireland.
- The graph shows Inseminations recoded on AI Handhelds in 2009 compared with 2008.

- Sign ups are going well with 301 herds taking part in the Autumn programme so far (205 herds in Autumn 2008).
- ↓ We have now fully tested 18 bulls on Gene Ireland in 2009.

7. Tully

• A total number of 105 high index bulls are involved in the current intake (Table 1). This number is up nearly 50% on the same intake, last year. This is a very exciting intake, with most bulls being top of their respective breed in terms of Suckler Beef Value and blups. There is also some exceptional bloodlines for example a bull sired by Domino out of Ballydonnan Simone (one of the highest index cows in the Charolais breed), along with new genetics i.e. Texan GIE.

- All bulls are in isolation with the first of 3 weekly blood samples, testing for IBR, taken from each bull this week. Bulls will be in isolation till the New Year, where the will then start their 90 day performance test.
- At present, bulls are being built up gradually on ad-lib concentrates with bulls being fed on average around 6 kilos with 2 kilos dry matter of hay per head, per day. All bulls have received booster vaccinations for RSV and PI3 (strains of pneumonia), along with vaccination against Blackleg and various clostridia diseases. Also, all bulls were vaccinated on entry for Ringworm.
