



## UPDATE - for period 5th-11th January 2008

#### 1 Important Dates

- **Thursday 31st January 2008.** 10:30 to 13:00. **Board Meeting**. Comfort Inn, Portlaoise.
- Friday 8<sup>th</sup> February 2008. Publication of updated dairy and beef genetic evaluations.
- ↓ 19<sup>th</sup> to 21<sup>st</sup> February. International Cattle Breeders Round Table. This scientific meeting is expected to involve forty scientists from mainly EU countries. A copy of the invitation is attached.

#### 2 Database Update





- ♣ 4,786 inseminations have been received so far in 2008 on the AI handhelds, compared with 3,825 in 2007 for the same period.
- ♣ There is some on-going work being done in relation to the upgrade, specifically around automating the backup procedures. Work will continue next week on tuning the system to get better performance.
- ♣ A significant amount of development work is still on-going in relation to the Suckler Scheme.

#### 3 Tully

- ♣ Weights and health testing results were sent out to breeders on the 10-1-08.
- ♣ A bio security audit at Tully will take place before the 18-1-08.
- ♣ The performance test for the December intake started on the 4-1-08

#### 4 HerdPlus Update

- The recruitment of Suckler Herds for the Herdplus & GROW scheme is ongoing.
- 4 Sign-up forms were posted to the initial target group for the G€N€Ireland programme.
- ♣ A presentation on HerdPlus was given at the awards ceremony of the EBI Discussion group competition in Moorepark.

#### **GROW (Genetic Recording of Weanlings)**

- ♣ In 2007, 111 commercial suckler farmers took part in the GROW Scheme.
- **♣** 3,500 weanlings were scored & weighed by the ICBF Linear Scorers.

- ♣ All of these Suckler Farmers received an 'ICBF Weanling Performance Report' which gives a summary of the Weights, Daily Gains & Scores for Loin & Hindquarter Development for their herd.
- ♣ These reports are useful to farmers making breeding & culling decisions and in particular allowing them to identify the superior females in their herds.
- ♣ The reports also allowed them to compare their herd's performance against other herds involved in this breeding initiative.
- ♣ The weight & score data collected in these commercial suckler herds through GROW in 2007 will have an important part to play in the February 2008 beef genetic evaluations due to the excellent contemporary group sizes.
- ♣ Well done to all involved in 2007 & the Herdplus Office is looking forward to increasing the number of Commercial Suckler herds involved in GROW in 2008

#### 5 EBI Discussion Group Competition

- ♣ On Tuesday the West Cork Greenfield Discussion Group won this competition sponsored jointly by TEAGASC, The Irish Farmers Journal, ACC Bank and ICBF. Full details have been published in the Farmers Journal. Some 130 people attended the award presentation at Moorepark. A copy of the presentation made by the ICBF and TEAGASC team on developments in dairy cattle breeding is on the publications section of the ICBF website (www.icbf.com).
- Feedback from the competition has been extremely positive. By involving groups of farmers in the competition the level of interest and amount of feedback has been much higher than with the competition focused on individual farmers. Feedback from the chairpersons of each of the six discussion group finalists was a particularly informative part of the meeting. We are now working with our partners to review plans for 2008.

#### 6 Genetic Evaluations

New domestic runs for milk production traits, fertility and survival traits, somatic cell count and calving performance have been completed. A new beef evaluation will commence over the weekend. The full range of Interbull files for milk production, fertility and longevity are expected to be released next week. The INTERBULL production results will then be used to update the cow production proofs before loading to the database.
