- Wednesday 11<sup>th</sup> October Dairy Genetic Evaluation Consultation meeting Moorepark.


## 2 Summary of decisions made at the Board Meeting, Thursday 14<sup>th</sup> September.


At meetings of the Board and the Finance Sub-Committee on Thursday the decisions taken included:

- To finalise the terms of reference for the review of structure and costs.
- Appointment of Deloitte's to conduct the review of structure and costs.
- To meet again next week to give further consideration to beef and dairy breeding scheme proposals.
- To continue discussions with the providers of DNA testing services and to consult with members before taking any firm decisions.

## 3 Database Update

- 25 new herds added to the database last week.
- The 152,000 inseminations mark has now been broken by those technicians using handhelds.
- Dairygold have taken more technicians live this week, and the current plan will have all technicians currently working live by the end of September.
- Progressive Genetics are also making good progress in cleaning up the data before going live with the North East technicians. It is expected that the training of these technicians will begin in early October, with all technicians up and running by November 1st.
- Good progress is being made on the development of the revised herd-book front end solution.
   This was originally planned for a 'go-live' pre-Christmas and this is still a realistic target.





The linear scoring of dairy
progeny test heifers has begun this week, and the feedback from the scorers has been positive on the new
software. Results for 500 heifers have been received so far this week.




• The commercial beef scoring project also kicked off this week, with the scorers using internet enabled laptops to populate missing sire information.

## 4 Tully

- A total of 195 bulls for the September intake were sent for health testing on the 13-9-06. Breeders received the test details on the 14-9-06.
- The sale date for the March sale on the 3-3-06 will have to be reviewed as it clashes with another multibreed sale on the same day. A date will be brought to the next Tully meeting.
- A group of farmers from Kilkenny will visit Tully the 18-9-06.

## **Dairy**

Further development work on international evaluations for fertility & longevity has now been completed. These new evaluations, when they become official through Interbull, will replace existing conversion equations.

#### **Beef**

Further improvements to the beef performance evaluations are being developed, including the publication of data on progeny and herd-mate performance for AI sires. This extra information will allow a better understanding of the benefits of the new genetic indexes for farmers and will be made available via the ICBF website bull search in the near future.

## **International Beef Evaluations**

Work on establishing genetic linkages between Irish & UK Simmentals has commenced. To-date some 211 animals represented in both countries have been identified, of which 72 were AI sires. Identification of these common sires will allow the development of conversion equations between the UK and Ireland for relevant traits, e.g., weaning weight and live-weight.

## 8 Open Days

ICBF was involved in the **beef** open day at Grange on Tuesday and then the **EBI €100** open day at the farm of Jim Delahunty on Wednesday.

## **Beef at Grange**

The Grange open day was attended by an estimated 1,500 people. TEAGASC had done a superb job of organising the event which ensured farmers were able to cover a wide range of topics relevant to beef production and to have access to the scientists doing the research.

ICBF had a stand which was manned by Andrew Cromie and Ross Evans. Brian Wickham was on the stand for a few hours in the afternoon.

There was steady interest all day with farmers asking about the new beef evaluations, the weaned calf initiative and the beef progeny test proposal. The farmers we met were generally well aware of ICBF's efforts to ensure greater rates of genetic improvement in the beef breeding industry. It is very encouraging to receive such positive feedback.
