2 ICAR Meeting – Bourg-en-Bresse, France — Brian Wickham

This week ICBF was represented at the annual meeting of ICAR in France. This in-between annual meeting was hosted by the French organizations involved in animal recording and genetic evaluations and focused mainly on performance recording. In 2011 the Interbull annual meeting is being held in association with the EAAP annual meeting in Norway in late August.

Some of the points of interest to ICBF and Ireland arising at this meeting were:

- → The Interbeef Working Group, which I chair, met and agreed to proceed with the launch of a new international genetic evaluation service for beef cattle. The agreement to do so has been under intense negotiation over the last few months and all remaining issues were resolved this week.
- ♣ The Sub-Committee for Recording Devices, now chaired by Martin Burke, met and in the course of the week important issues associated with linking new generation milking machines to milk recording systems were progressed.
- French and other organisations reported on a range of systems for linking on-farm data capture devices to central databases. These developments cover electronic identification, recording of hoof trimming, heat detection and milk recording. This integration of data capture devices with central databases in enabling milk recording organisations to provide ever better information services to farmers.
- In a series of presentations addressing the phenotyping of complex traits, such as health and reproduction, the key point to emerge was that solutions to many of the problems currently facing farmers is dependent on the availability of large amounts of such data from commercial herds.
- Milk recording services stand to benefit greatly from the OptiMIR project that Ireland is a partner in, to use MIR (mid-infra-red) measurements on milk samples to measure a wide range of new traits and to provide more useful management information to herd owners.
- → The ICAR Certificate of Quality has been earned by a number of organisations including ICBF for Ireland's recording and genetic evaluation systems. This quality assurance system is helping organisations improve the quality of the data available to farmers and for use in genetic evaluations.
- We announced the program for ICAR 2012 which will be held at the Rochestown Park Hotel in Cork. Key features of the program (copy attached) is a focus on recording as a means of providing farmers and breeders with information that can be used to improve the profitability of farming. The program features two industry days, dairy on Monday and beef & sheep on Tuesday, where a panel of international speakers will address the topic of "Information for Profitable Farming". These two days are targeted at the decision makers in recording










- ♣ The stats above are compiled with the assistance of DAFF AIM systems.
- ♣ In the Suckler scheme, the number of 2010 born calves with meal introduced is 616,334 with the number of animals weaned at 550,224.
- ♣ Weight recording forms have been distributed to all Herdplus Beef herds, with the final batches going out today.
- A number of updates have been made to the weight recording screens and outputs this week, with a view to streamlining the existing process.
- The first of the Farm Relief Service operators will go live next week using handhelds linked to the ICBF database to record lameness data. This will be valuable data for genetic evaluations.
- Work is on-going in establishing electronic links to the commercial animal health laboratories. A number of meetings took place this week with individual labs and good
- Further development is taking place on the screens that vets and labs will use to facilitate the recording of health test results.
- The DEP scheme recording sheet and web screens have now been completed. Details on what is involved will be presented at the Teagasc stand at the Moorepark Open day next week.
