3 Animal Health Ireland

It is pleasing to be able to report progress with the establishment of a herd health scheme for Ireland. This is being sought be cattle breeders and the wider industry.

This industry led initiative has progressed with the announcement by DAFF of:

- the formation of *Animal Health Ireland*,
- the formation of an interim **Steering Group** to be chaired by Mike Magan,
- the provision of initial funding,
- the provision of interim staffing, and
- the establishment of a **Stakeholders Group**. The Stakeholders Group is scheduled to meet with the interim Steering Group in the next few days.

The Chairman of ICBF, John O'Sullivan, has also been appointed to the interim **Steering Group** and I will represent ICBF in the **Stakeholders Group**.

The aims of **Animal Health Ireland** are:

- To determine and, on an industry-wide basis, obtain agreement on a range of animal health interventions capable of enhancing on-farm productivity and international competitiveness of the Irish livestock industry.
- To develop and coordinate the national infrastructure that will be needed to enable industry at all levels to take appropriate and effective action.

6 Two New Event Recording Screens

Two new animal event recording screens are now operational.

Record Farmer Rating

- ♣ This screen allows herd owners to rate their first lactation animals in relation to:
 - i. Farmer Satisfaction
 - ii. Temperament
 - iii. Milking Speed
 - iv. Leakage
- The objective is to use this information in genetic evaluations and establish a link to profitable traits such as production, fertility and health.

Record TG Health (Teagasc Health Project)

- This screen allows herd owners to record any animal in the milking herd that has had incidences of the following health events during the past season.
 - i. Mastitis
 - ii. Lameness
 - iii. Retained Placenta

- The aim of this research is to quantify whether daughters of some sires have poorer health than daughters of other sires. The data collected will also be used to investigate whether selection on EBI is improving the health status of Irish herds and what mechanisms can be put in place to ensure that no negative effects of selection on EBI occur.
- Letters were sent to HerdPlus[®] clients this week in relation to Animal Health, but we encourage as many herd-owners as possible to record these events over the coming weeks through our website.

7 Sheep

All areas of the Sheep Ireland plan are developing well:

- Protocols for double tagging and performance recording, for both pedigree and MALP breeders, are nearing finalisation.
- Further meetings are being held with MALP breeders to get all up to speed with the weighing and double tagging that will begin next week in these flocks.
- A lambing book has been developed with the LambPlus service team and will be ready for lambing recording.
- Web screens and printed pages for data capture are being developed.
- ↓ LambPlus training course times and locations are to be announced early next week.
- The Sheep Ireland scheme and the LambPlus service are being presented around the country at Teagasc Sheep meetings so we invite you to come along.
- We are getting a good response from breeders.



8 Genetic Evaluations


Dairy


Work is ongoing on genomic selection research in tandem with Donagh Berry from Moorepark. Data extractions for use in training populations are currently being undertaken.

Beef

A new round of mart data collection has commenced. It is anticipated that the utilisation of suitable mart records for genetic evaluation purposes will increase significantly as a result of the suckler cow welfare scheme. There are now potentially enough docility recordings available from the suckler welfare scheme (400,000) to allow commencement of research on this trait which will commence in the coming week.

- ≠ 515,050 inseminations have been received so far in 2008, compared with 363,954 in 2007 for the same period.
- The work on revamping the AI software for next season is continuing. Testing of the finalised solution began this week and has been provided to some of the organisations this week. Further users will receive the application next week.
- There continues to be a lot of activity in the Suckler Scheme. The number of calves with a meal feeding introduction has increased to 650,000, with just over 460,000 of these having been weaned.
- The revamp of the Milk Recording system continues.

 Work on the data inputting screens will begin next week.
- This week, work has continued on migrating the Sheep Performance system to the ICBF/Sheep Ireland database, and on building the systems to handle the flock reconciliation activities which will be undertaken in the coming weeks.
- Work is continuing on the Genomic Selection applications, working in conjunction with Donagh Berry at Moorepark.
- This week saw the installation of new servers and storage. This extra capacity is necessary to handle the increased data in respect of the suckler scheme, genomic selection and the Sheep Ireland database.
- The hardware that is being installed is:
 - HP Storage Works EVA 6100 SAN (storage area network) with 12 terabytes (a lot of disk space!) and capacity for as much again.
 - HP rx3600 Itanium Servers running HP-UX 11i V2.
 - Proliant DL380 Storage Server.
