### 2. Beef Breeding - Tully Bull Sale - SBV leads to greater profits - €200 million "prize" on offer

On Monday (3<sup>rd</sup> May) we will be holding a sale of the beef bulls that have recently completed their performance test at Tully. All bulls tested at Tully have been kept at the health status required for entry to AI. We made this commitment to minimise the risk of bulls failing health tests for their entry to AI. Only one bull from the current intake has been purchased for AI. This bull has already gone to the AI centre. Naturally, we are disappointed that so few of the very high merit bulls in this intake have been selected to go into AI. Beef cattle breeding in Ireland cannot make rapid genetic progress if these bulls do not get used in AI. We will be conducting a thorough review over the next few weeks of the issues resulting in such a low uptake by AI.

However, the loss to AI is an opportunity for herd owners to obtain very high merit stock bulls with a very high health status. Over half the bulls are five stars, within breed, for Suckler Beef Value (SBV) and thus represent the elite of young beef bulls in Ireland.

The benefit of using the SBV to select bulls was demonstrated in a recent study¹ of the economic returns from the progeny of five star vs one star bulls for SBV. The progeny of the five star bulls can be expected to return an extra €168 per animal compared to the progeny of one star bulls. The extra returns come from a combination of factors including: easier calving, greater weaning weights, greater carcass weights, better carcass grades, younger age at slaughter and daughters that produce extra milk, and survive longer. The great strength of the €uro-Star indexes is that they contain the information needed to select bulls with the strengths required by suckler herd owners and by bull breeders.

We are projecting that by 2020 an extra €200 million of profits could be delivered to the beef industry by better breeding. This is an incredible opportunity for beef farmers and breeders. If you are interested in seeing, or buying, the type of bulls that can deliver on this promise come along to the Tully Sale on Monday. We look forward to meeting you there and discussing the actions required enable beef farmers to capture the €200 million of extra profit that can be delivered by better breeding.







#### 3. Database






- ♣ The stats above are compiled with the assistance of DAFF AIM systems.
- ♣ In the Suckler scheme, the number of 2009 born calves with meal introduced is 626,131 with the number of animals weaned at 554,978.
- Work is on-going to update the ICBF website to handle the requirements of Animal Health Ireland, beginning with their BVD programme. All Vets who were already using the ICBF system have been

♣ Updates to the Grow report (beef linear scoring) to include the sending of genetic evaluations are in the final stages of testing and should be live next week.

### 4. Genetic Evaluations

### **Beef**

- The monthly update of beef performance, linear score and docility evaluations for animals scored and weighed from March 16<sup>th</sup> to April 15<sup>th</sup> were run this week. The new proofs for these animals will be loaded to the database over the weekend and will be available early next week.
- Work is continuing on improvements in the maternal weaning weight and the calving performance evaluations.

#### International Beef

♣ A file of 1,200 Hereford animals has been sent this week to the Hereford society in the UK. This file has been edited to gather animals that are present in the Irish database, but also in the UK database. The matching animals will have their UK proofs for direct and maternal weaning weight incorporated in the Irish Genetic evaluation as a correlated trait. The objective is to consolidate the genetic merit of animals well proven outside Ireland for these traits, into their Irish evaluations.

### 5. G€N€IR€LAND®

- All the available Holstein Friesian and Friesian straws have now been allocated. There is still some availability for the XBRED pack. We await the arrival of more Friesian straws next week.
- 4 Across all available breeds 600 herds have taken 22,816 doses so far.

### 6. Sheep Ireland

- LambPlus breeders continue to add lambing and weighing data daily, any breeders who have not done so are urged to do so as soon as possible.
- ♣ Breeders should contact Donegal Farm Relief Service (074-9145386), to organise ultra sound scanning for fat and muscle depth to be carried on their Lambs at 120 to 140 days old.
- ♣ Preparations are ongoing for the Sheep 2010 day at Lyons UCD 26TH June. Sheep Ireland will have a demonstration on the day that will focus on the various aspects of the Sheep Ireland Breeding Program.

### 7. HerdPlus

- ♣ ICBF attended the recent Kilkenny Agricultural Society Multibreed Bull Sale.
- HerdPlus Reports were on display and there was good interest at the stand.
- **♣** €uro-Stars were also displayed on the day for the Beef Bulls at the Sale.
- **♣** EBI Indexes were also displayed for the Dairy Bulls.
- ♣ Aberdeen Angus, Charolais, Hereford, Limousin & Simmental, Holstein & Friesian Bulls were on offer.
- The Index information allowed Purchasers to concentrate on the particular Breeding Goal that interested them (see photo).
- ♣ There was a positive correlation between index figures and sale price on the day.
- ♣ Beef Bulls for 37 Limousin Bulls with recorded bid prices the following correlations were found between Price bid and Overall SBV & Muscle BLUP:
