1. Interbull & EAAP meetings Dublin 24th - 30th August

The Interbull and EAAP meetings were held in Ireland over the past week. The meetings are annual events in the animal breeding and production calendars and attract people from all over the world in the areas of animal breeding, physiology and nutrition.

This year's meetings were held in UCD, with some 1,000 delegates from over 40 different countries converging on the Belfield campus. Delegates were treated to a combination of excellent science, hospitality and weather, making it a memorable occasion for all involved.

The meetings highlighted the key role that science can play in delivering increased profit for livestock farmers. The challenge for the future will be to ensure that this science is delivered to farmers and the industry in a user-friendly manner that allows them make well informed breeding and management decisions.

Interbull Meeting.

Interbull (or International Bull Evaluation Service), is the body responsible for international evaluations of dairy and beef cattle. This week's annual meeting attracted delegates from 35 different countries (some 150 delegates in total). Delegates were from a wide range of backgrounds, including research scientists, technical staff, breed association staff and AI representatives. Key areas covered during the 2-day meeting included;

- International beef evaluations.
- National and international evaluation of fertility traits.
- Developments in national and international dairy evaluation methods.

There were 46 presentations in total, with 6 coming from Irish scientists, including papers from Donagh Berry (Teagasc), Thierry Pabiou (ICBF), Ross Evans (ICBF), John Hickey (ID Lelystad), Paddy Cunningham (DAF) & Eileen Wall (SAC). Key messages from the conference for Irish cattle breeders were;

- International beef evaluations are now moving at a fast rate, with scientists from Ireland, Australia and USA presenting the latest developments in international evaluations for a range of beef breeds and beef traits. A further 6 countries will soon join the Interbeef evaluation for Limosuin and Charolais. Other countries expressed a strong willingness to initiate international evaluations for other breeds, most notably for Simmentals.
- Female fertility is now a trait of major international significance with all of the main dairying countries now evaluating this trait on a routine basis. In addition many of the countries now include female fertility directly in their economic index. For example, the UK now includes female fertility in its Productive Life Index with a weighting of 18%, which is quite comparable to the weighting that the trait is given in the EBI formula.
- *Genomic selection* is a tool of increasing interesting to animal breeders. Papers at the conference suggested that it had the potential to increase rates of genetic gain considerably, with one scientist comparing it to the level of increase that was achieved when AI was first introduced.

The Interbull meeting was kindly co-sponsored by the Irish Farmers Journal, who also hosted the conference dinner.

EAAP Meeting


The Interbull meeting was then followed by the EAAP (European Association of Animal Production) meeting, attracting some 900 delegates in total. The meeting covered 9 different areas (commissions) related to animal production, with each of these running concurrently during the course of the 3 day conference;


- Animal Genetics
- Animal Physiology
- Animal Nutrition
- Animal Management & Health
- Cattle Production
- Sheep & goat production
- Pig production
- Horse production
- Livestock farming systems.

Again Irish scientists were heavily involved with researchers/students from Teagasc, UCD and Trinity all presenting results on a range of areas, including TB resistance (Mairead Bermingham), Energy balance (Donagh Berry), Inbreeding (Sinead McParland), Calving Difficulty (John Hickey) and Across Breed Comparisons of dairy cattle (Noreen Begley). Each of these studies were based on data from the ICBF cattle breeding database.

One additional component to the EAAP meeting was the cattle breeding tour, organised by ICBF. The tour visited two commercial farms, one dairy and one beef. The farms involved were David Johnson, Redcross, Co. Wicklow and Paul Kinch, Arklow, Co. Wicklow. A full update on these 2 farm visits will be included with next weeks update.

2. Database Update





- **4** 341,230 inseminations have been received so far in 2007, compared with 148,121 in 2006 for the same period.
- 4 The majority of herd-books are continuing to use the new Web Front end as the main means of completing Herdbook administration activities. Focus is now switching towards ensure that the catalogue process is in order for the coming sales season.
- Further work on HerdPlus modules is on-going, focusing around the data recording aspects, and the new 'look and feel' to the farmer interface.
- ♣ Progress continues on the redesign of the Animal Events file processing which will be completed over the coming months.
- Work on Gene Ireland reports and user interfaces is also on-going, in advance of the Autumn Gene Ireland programme kicking off for both dairy and beef.


- ♣ Security fencing to divide the office area from the bull housing area will be finished before the 6-9-07
